Please ensure you contact reception **EVERY DAY** that your child is off sick before 9.15am. This could either



Volunteering with the National Trust

Some of our Yr11 pupils have been visiting the various National Trusts sites across North Norfolk (Sheringham Park, Felbrigg Hall and Horsey) over the last few months to take part in getting people more engaged with their environment, particularly through the medium of



environmental listening and sound recording.

The pupils have been recording different natural sounds using a range of microphones. With the idea of turning these recordings into soundwalks and using these recordings to create podcasts to be broadcasted by a local radio station.

and Art. They made each of the planets and created bright and colourful rockets. They are looking forward to the next story on their journey!





Fig class has had a busy half term! Here are some of our highlights! Fig has been learning all about the Middle Ages, the feudal system,

knights, castles and what everyday life was like. In English, the class read and evaluated advertisements before writing their own for a toy of their choice. Multiplication and division has been the focus in Maths, looking at representations such as arrays and using multilink to scale and then moving on to using place value counters to



multiply and divide. In Art we have been working on portraits in the style of Picasso; our results have been very interesting! Finally we have been identifying different types of birds, making bird feeders for them, then walking and spotting the birds we have learnt about.





<u>Birch class</u> studied the work of Alberto Giacometti in Art. They looked at his sketches,




Life in Residential....
