Here at Sidestrand Hall School we take safeguarding your children very seriously.



We recently had the immunisation team in administering the Flu Vaccination to our Students. If your child missed out, here are a few dates when they are in the area.





You will remember last year's house vote being an incredibly successful, democratic process where every child was able to cast a vote on animals they had chosen to represent their house. These have now given each house team greater identity and, in turn, a new purpose to become House Cup Winners 2023-24.

Already this year, we can see an obvious increase in the number of House Points pupils are earning and contributing to their houses' success, and the race for first place is truly on. To make this more exciting for each pupil on a personal level, we have also introduced the Sidestrand Hall Rewards Graduation. Pupils can now work to reach certain House Point thresholds, and at each one receive a reward of recognition. So far this year, dozens of pupils have received texts home congratulating them for earning 25 house points, and we currently have a large group of pupils who will receive postcards home celebrating their 50 point milestone. We are so delighted that we are now running our own swimming lessons in Lower School with our very own swim teacher. So far it has been a great success and the children are really enjoying the sessions. Over the course of the year we will be working through different swimming badge schemes.

This half term Acorns Class and a few from Olive Class have been working towards getting their Octopus Level 1 badge, which involves how to enter the water safely, blowing bubbles in water and trying to put their faces in the water.

Conkers and Olive are working towards Octopus Level 2 which involves trying to swim 5 metres front paddle with a woggle and trying to perform a star float for 5 seconds.

Four students from Conkers Class have been working towards Octopus Level 3 which involves trying to perform a rescue to each other, which they have successfully done and also trying to swim 5 metres on their front, rolling onto their back and then back on their front again.

Welcome to a new school year and to those new staff and pupils who have joined us. Governors have already met to review the statutory documents, and completed our Safeguarding training. We extend our thanks to Mr Lloyd Johnson for all his work as a Parent Governor, as he has resigned from his post, which means

Endeavour Class



We have been following the Titan programme for pedestrian training in Cromer. Students get the opportunity to practise crossing the roads using different types of crossings



independently. In the summer they will have a chance to complete the Titan assessment walking totally independently around Cromer.

This term we also went to the Foodbank.



Did you know that the food here is given away for free? They do not just give out food, they give out toiletries, sanitary towels and pet food.

They have baby food for families, and every box has chocolate and crisps.

There are lots of food banks across Norfolk. The food banks are run by paid staff and volunteers. Fresh foods are put into community fridges and this food is for free for everyone. For the foodbank you need a voucher.

Tim told us all about the work they do in Cromer. It was interesting to see them weigh the food. Last year they gave out 70 tonnes of food and products.

The Art and Textile Option groups had a fabulous day exploring the art installations at Houghton Hall. For some children, this was the first time they had experienced so many huge, abstract sculptures that you could interact with. The art ranges from water and fire fountains to buildings where you sit and watch the sky form ever-changing pictures. The gardens are stunning and the children particularly loved the walled garden - dare I



say, one of the best in England, even at this time of the year. I think the children came away inspired, and we shall certainly be using some of our ideas in future art projects.


A Midsummer Night's Dream Madness

This half term we have had Norwich Puppet Theatre come into school to work with us on the play 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. Some students have looked at this in previous years and Year 7's will be looking at it as part of their Literacy Curriculum later in the year. They watched a performance of the play. This used shadows, lights and music to tell the story. The children joined in with and Miss Sear even got up on stage to play the part of one of the Mechanicals. They thought it was really funny when one of the characters had a spell put on them to turn them into a donkey. The students were allowed to go up at the end and explore some of the



props and look at the projector. After this, Year 7 groups had two workshops exploring the magical world in the story and also the language. They looked at rhyme and natural language and made up their own poetic lines with actions, which they performed to each other. We all had a really good day.

We've enjoyed a busy first half term in Pine Class and the weeks have flown by. The children are really enjoying our work on Queen Victoria and have written some brilliant



amazing time trying out the different activities and bouncing around the place. Well done to all for a great start in PE and we look forward to the next busy half term leading up to Christmas.




